- Leave a legacy here on earth that will have eternal results for generations to come.
 - "I somehow know the earth isn't my real home" (Eccles 3:11)(Muggeridge)
 - "But I want to be remembered here" (OT curses)
 - "I want to be part of Hebrews 12:1" (the great cloud of witnesses) How?
- Enhance my position in my permanent home, heaven.
 - "I know I have to leave it all" (Wesley)(Rockefeller)
 - "I know I'm going to heaven but can I send treasure ahead and get rewards?"

So how do I get started to minimize regrets, no matter how much time I have left?

- Remind yourself of limited time left (Ps 90:12)(Lee Strobel)
 - Number your days—apply your heart to wisdom
- Create the 'margin' to plan for fewer regrets!
 - "God never intended for time to oppress us" (Richard Swenson, Margin)
 - Retreat!
 - Write down what you want to accomplish in both areas.
 - Leaving a legacy
 - Sending treasure ahead

Getting Practical About Legacy In Your Ministry

Have a focused mission

- It is possible to be well managed and "do lots of good" without being focused on permanent and significant results.
 - "The desktop novelty machine"
 - CHA when I walked in
- Being focused means having a mission statement by which everything is measured
 - Pleases the King (eternal)(Matt 22, 25, 28)
 - Inspirational
 - □ Fits on a T-shirt (Drucker). (Well, at least the slogan should)
- Importance of translating the mission into a goal and vision
 - Money follows vision

Getting Practical About Legacy In Your Ministry (continued) "You're not a success until you have a successor." (Lamar Vest)

- It's an important component of "no regrets"
- Timing is key: leave too early and you are a quitter and your work incomplete. Hang on too long and your good work unravels.
- So much loss in ministry today, so much backtracking, so much unproductive change.
- Two models
 - a. American corporate
 Wait til the incumbent leaves—hire an executive recruiter—consider inside candidates if appropriate—and start over
 - II Tim. 2:2
 Paul: Mentor a faithful man or woman who can build on what you're doing.
 Moses, Samuel, David and Elijah laid the framework for successors.
- Importance of a plan and time to implement a plan

Legacy in Our Personal Life: Some Thoughts

A view of investing in people

There are no ordinary people. You have never talked to a mere mortal...It is a serious thing to live in a society of possible gods and goddesses to remember that the dullest and most uninteresting person you talk to may one day be a creature...you would strongly, be tempted to worship...or else a horror and a corruption. - Legacy with family
 - Making sure they know what your heart is
 - In our family:
 - Be there
 - Be a war hero
 - Pass it on
- Communicating and documenting
 - From elaborate to simple—but leave something as a clue
 - Peter Kreeft's "Before I Go"
 - My father's journals
 - Assembling my collection
- The question of money
 - Money can be used to reinforce passing the faith or to retard it.
 - What's the difference?
 - □ In general—"Do your givin' while you're living: then you're knowin' where it's going"

Some special considerations with personal legacy

Risk Taking

- 80% of people at the end of life say they wish they'd taken more risks
- The Bob Biehl question:

"If you could do anything you wanted, and you had all the time, money, staff, education and every resource you needed, and you knew for certain that you couldn't fail, what would you do?"

Making Sure I Used My Talents

- The tragedy of "dying with the music still in you" (Oliver Wendell Holmes quote)
- But you can hear "well done" anyway (Spurgeon story)
- And obedience more important than self-expression
- Finding the special gift at any age also pleases the Lord
- Took test at 62!

Preparing for My Real Home

- Treasure: you can't take it with you but you can send it on ahead (Alcorn, The Treasure Principle) (Wilkinson, A Life God Rewards)
 - Scripture seems to say that a variety of things we do here on earth result in treasure and rewards in heaven (Matt. 6:19-21)
 - Alcorn's dot and line
 - Earthly treasures aren't bad, but they're "confederate money"
 - □ Things that qualify for "sending on ahead"
 - Persevering under persecution (Luke 6:22-23)
 - Treating enemies kindly (Luke 6:35)
 - Kindness to children (Matt 10:45)
 - Helping the poor (Matt 19:21, Luke 14:13-14)
 - Generous giving (multiple refs)
